enemy into believing that 29 Brigade was relieved by US troops. The object being to coax the enemy to despatch patrols or probes into our positions where he would run into more determined opposition than is normally expected from the US Army. To carry out this deception (a) we must appear like Americans, therefore all forward troops are wearing American Steel Helmets, (b) we must sound like Americans, therefore we have adopted American Wireless Proceedure. To date the operation appears to be having some success. RCR intercepted a message meant for them which opened with "HELLO AMERICAN". The enemy patrols are more bold in approaching our FBLs and he appears to be very interested in capturing a prisoner. However as yet we have not realized the full fruit of our operation see appx 4).
