Condensed War diary ppcli FROM 24 AUG to SEP 23 1944

Onthe 24 Aug the bn was conce in the area of Barchi 126544 sheet 109 about 2 miles S of the R.Metauro. The stage was set for the first stages of the attack on the Gothic Line after a period of conce preparation. In keeping with the policy of the Bah Army all ranks were fully informed as to plans and intentions as well as all available info of the enemy. So far our efforts to keep our identity a secret had been successful with everyone cooperating fully.

Patrols had been sent out to recce F.U.P.'s and Viver X-ings of the river and all was in readiness. Tac BHQ moved about midday on the 25th to a posn overlooking our sector of the Metauro. Marching tps were in their F.U.P. 's by 2130 hrs. The plan was to effect a silent approach and King of the R. Metauro and be in posn to assault the high grd to the N at H hr + 59 (H hr =2300 hrs). At H + 59 the arty of 3 Divs would fire on posns to the N of Via Flaminia and lift at the rate of 100 yds. in ene minute, under cover of which our inf would advance. Timed to the second the rty barrage started and the two fwd coys encountered but slight resistance during their advance across the Via Flaminia. C and D coys followed closely and by 6355 hrs all obj had been taken. The bn suffered 3 cas from SCHU mines on the S river bank, The 7 PW taken were very shaken fellows. Their average age was 17 yrs.

The bn disposn was now Acoy Pt 127 at112671, Bcoy in the town of Serrungarina 094620, C coy at 097733 and D coy pt 217 103626. Tac BHQ moved during the afternoon of the 26 to Serrungarina. Our assault across the Metauro had been well planned and executed but a little disappointing as so little fight had been found in the enemy.

The CO, Lt Col D.H.Rosser, having attended an O gp at 2 CIB HQ, called am bn O Gp at SERRUNGARINA at 0005 hrs of the 27th. All coyand sp. pl cmdrs attended. Orders for the next phase of the attack were issued. News that attacks by flanking formations had and were going well was also given. The bn was to attack on the axis Serrungarina Monte della Mattera

O766- M. Croce O468, one coy up with a series of leapfrog actions to intermediate objectives on the axis of adv. which were given code names. The system of allotting a familiar name to objectives had proved its value already in the action, and, as those which had are between additional ones were laid on by the CO as follows- O67660- PLUM, O64663 - PEACH, O58672 \_ LEMON, O53677- NUTS, O50690- PATSY, O48693 ROSE, O51692 - PEGGY, O52692 - DOLLY. The bn moved off from area Serrungarina at 0230 hrs of the 27th to a conc area at 077657 and were in posn there at 0630 hrs when the CO held an first O Gp to issue final instr for the attack.

The men were in fine fettle, inspired by their initial easy successes and ready to tackle anything.

The bn was to attack in the order C B A D coys At 0645 hrs & coy moved off and passing through PLUM and PEACH reached their obj NUTS from there sending a fighting patrol, across the R Arzilla where the enemy were contacted for the time. 5 PW were taken with no cas to the patrol. B coy following slightly to the right proceeded to take PATSY with no trouble Acoy reached PLUM at 0800 hrs at which pt D coy passed through them to PEACH. This leapfrog action continued till B coy was on DOBBS 042689. B coy came under heavy Shell fire at this pt also some SA fire was coming from the village of M. S. Maria 033684 Acting on his own initiative Maj C.M.McDougall OC B coy sent one pl of his coy to take the town. Good covering fire was afforded this attack by our MMG pl who had man-packed their guns forward through difficult and confusing entry All obj were takem by 1745 hrs and fully consolidated with the exception of D coy who had overshot their obj and gone 1000 yds beyond coming under hvy shell and mortar fire. They were forced to consolidate there after suffering 4 killed and 11 wounded.

The whole of the ridge from M. S. S Maria to M. Croce was now in our hands from which all of the surrounding entry could be dominatinged. Although under hvy shellfire the feature was well consolidated; at 0430 hrs of the 28th a party of approx enemy under the impression that 25 strong believed to be reinforcements believing the villageros Men's Maria still in German hands, entered the village without stealth from the West. The Platoon of B coy in occupation waited calmly and when in good range engaged them with SA and grenades. Evavy casualties were inflicted on the enemy, B coy suffering 2 casualties. During the afternoon of the 27th Tac Bn HQ had moved to 060666 and at 0540 hours started off for M.S. Maria The CO, Lt Col D.H. Rosser, some distance in the lead, was stoppped by an exchange of SA fire between a party of enemy and an outpost of B coy. The Scout and Sniper Platoon was rushed forward to deal with the enemy and succeeded in beating them off forcing them to leave one PW and 6 dead. Tac Bn HQ arrived at M.S. Maria at 0820 hrs.

During the afternoon 128 Bde 46 Br Div put in an attack on WXXENNXXX Montegaudio 020863 approx 1½ miles to our left. Enemy retreating from this attack, ran diagonally across our Bn front, our MMG Pl and arty rep had a Field day engaging the enemy with very good effect. 26 M MS along word 14,000 rules and

At 1800 hrs it became known that IRO would relieve us during the night. The Bn would move to an Conc Area 099659 to prepare for a new phase of the attack. The 29th Aug was spent in the Conc Area resting and cleaning up. Late in the afternoon a warning order arrived from Bde HQ regarding a move forward 1800 next morning.

Maj R.P. Clark moved off for the next Assembly Area at Ginestreto 051721/. At a conference held that morning at bde the 60 was given orders for the next operation. The main defs of the Gothic Line had been reached and all was in readiness for the assault.

the north fairly bristled with red printed enemy strongpoints; the real thing had been reached.

The enemy posns consisted of mutually sting supplied pill boxes and strongpoints with many MG and ATK posns covering the belt of wire and minefields just to the N of the R. Foglia.

The bn arrived in the area of Ginestreto at 1230 hrs Aug at TCV's and took over the area formerly occupied by the Carleton & York Regt. At approx 1400 hrs the CO and Party arrived. Soon after the CO was confined to bed with malaria and the 2IC Maj. R.P.Clark took over command of the bn. He prompthy held an O gp at approx 2000 hrs when the plan of attack was laid. Patrols reported the approaches and Kings of the river in good condition just before midnight. Again the plan was to effect a silent onight King of the River to be in posn to attack the main defs of the line at first light. Order of march for the bn was C D B A coys

The brhd coys C & D, maved off at 0005 hrs and without opposition were established at trk junc 026751 code name ROSE and 030756 ABBEYVILLE respectively at 0430 hrs. The brhd having been firmly established by the two fwd coys spred by the bn MMG pl, B coy moved from Ginestreto and advanced on their obj Osteria Nuova (Almondstown) 021758 at first light. The river was negotiated successfully but on passing through C coy, B coy encountered a belt of wire and a mine the in front of an ATK ditch S of the lateral rd. 3 cas were suffered King these obstacles and the coy was coming under some SA fire. However the advance was continued and ALMONDSTOWN was reported snug at 0600 hrs. The German, had levelled the Willage to clear a field of fire but so great had been the element of surprise in our attack that effective fire could not be brought to bear until our troops were safely entrenched in the ruins. Our arty and ATK guns had been active during this advance lacing the commanding heights above Osteria Nuova; A coy had been held in reserve on the N bank of the river. Tac Bn HQ had moved fwd to ROSE at 1100 hrs.

The GOTHIC LINE having definitely been breached, C and D coys were ordered fwd to objectives Nof the lateral rd. C cox attacked rd and trk junc 015755 at 0930 hrs and after suffering 5 cas in crossing the minefield and ditch carried their obj, taking 96 PW. D coy took hill feature JOHN BULL at 017760 at a cost of 6 cas taking 23 PW at 1330 hrs. A coy was now committed and advanced on the last remaining dominant feature of our sector of the Like; what was to prove to be a key pt at 023768 (HERTZ). Supported by B Sqn 48 RTR A coy attacked frontally up the slope of the feature which had previously been heavily engaged by our arty. At a cost of 27 Ka 7 cas HERTZ was taken by 1445 hrs; In conjunction with the the 97 PW were taken.

The Bn remained consolidated in these posns during the remainder of the day and night.

Enemy arty had been active all day but had accounted for very few cas. The ability of the spt tks to go forward was due to the efforts of the Pnr Pl who worked under extreme difficulty clearing a passage through the minefield.

Total PW taken 231.

On the morning 1 Sep orders were received though Bde LO for the next phase of the operation.

The Bn was to attack slightly to the right of the present location on the axis - POZZO ALTO 
C. Berelli 032794 - to the right of Monteluro.

At 1230 hrs the CO, Maj R.P. Clark, held an O Gp to tee up the attack. The Bn would move that afternnon to codename BALLY BO 034789 at that time held by the Seaf of C and conc there preparatory to the attack. B Sqn 48 RTR would again sp the attack.

At 1700 hrs the Bn moved to BALLY BO by march route and were conc there by 1850 hrs. The area was then under med hvy shellfore. At 2100 hrs the CO held an O Gp and gave orders for the attack which was to go in immediately. Again a series of private unit codenames were allotted to intermediate

objectives as follows: ALICE 033794 BLUE 029797, GOWN 024804, BLACKIE 020809, JOAN 030812, BESSBOROUGH 024813, Order of march was to be C D B A coys.

No opposition was met by C coy and their objective BESSBOROUGH was reported snug at 2340 hrs. D coy passed through C and took JOAN after having been ambushed by the enemy and suffering 1 offr and 2 Ors cas.

B coy formed a firm base at BLUE. A coy with the tks followed up and after page light opposition secured their objective 034825.

The Bn was re-shuffled to fully consolddate the posna during the day [2 Sep); hen intermittent shelling which caused no damage the day was fairly quiet. Tac Bn HQ moved during the day from BESSBOROUGH to S. Stefano 022825 and at 1630 hrs the Bn was disposed A coy034825, B\*coy 024837(Codename BROADFORD), C coy 031831 (BRIDGETOWN), D coy N portion of S. Stefano. The enemy had put up only scattered resistance to our attack and it was evident that he was withdrawing rather hastily. 88-mm guns had been found by B coy at BROADFORD, and A coy had captured 2 ration trucks which had blundered into them during the advance. Enemy arty fire had been light and ineffect in the Bn area, making possible the bringing up of A Ech vehs. The coy kitchen vehs were warmly welcomed.

Scon after the arrival of Tac Bn HQ at S.

Stefano our acting CO, Maj R.P. Clark, was notified of his promotion to Lt Col in the absence of Lt Col D.H. Rosser.

A patrol to Gradara (1084) reported the town vacated by the enemy as of early that morning 2 Sep.

The 3 Sep. (the fifth anniversary of the war) was spent in resting and cleaning up. 3 War Correspondents visited the Bn for stories of the past actions.

At 1900 hrs Lt Col D.H. Rosser returned

by illness and resumed command from Maj A/Tollier R.P. Clark.

A surprise and very surprising visit from the long absent Luftwaffe was experienced during the evening when approx 3 aircraft scattered incendiary and Anti-personnel bombs over the Bde area. No damage or cas were suffered in the Bn area.

for a period of rest which was to last till the 15th.

The Bn was billetted completely indoors along a street in the SW end of the town running parallel to the sea where only 75 yds away. The inhabitants of the town had been forced to evacuate by the Germans and had not yet returned so cous were able to choose billets at will; we evening found the Bn very comfortably settled in various seaside resort hotels and private dwellings. An enjoyable 10 days were spent in these restful surroundings disturbed only by 5 consecutive raids by GAF to the first 5 days of our stay in Cattolica.

On the 14th Sep the Bn was put on 2 hrs notice to move as from 1900 hrs. This was not a surprise, and born of long experience the Bn soon stood in readiness for the orders to move. The CO, Lt Col D.H. Rosser, had attended several conferences at Bde HQ and all details for the next operation were arranged.

At 1400 hrs the CO held a conference of all coy and supporting arms comds. The plan of attack was fully dealt with and the part of each formation comd was explained.

their job was to clear the way to the line of the railway 843928 (101) to 855946 (101), after which 2 Bde would do the rest, namely clearing the S. Fortunato - CORIGNANO feature to the SW of Rimini and cut north to the coast rd at Celle 835988. A steady pressure was to be maintained by the Greeks on the coast sector. The Patricias in the original plan were to attack left, Seaf of C right with the Edmontons passing through and cutting

the coast rd at Celleo after the Fortunato feature
was secured. 3 Bde would parallel our attack on
the left with 4 Br Div to the left of 3 Bde.
Rimini would be by-passed, therefore it was hoped with hope that
to cut off the force holding it would be control.

At 1215 hrs the 15th the Bn moved of a conc area at 940858 by march route arriving there at 1500 hrs. The Bn Supporting arms, B Sqn 145 Regt RAC, 1 pl 4.2 mor, 1 pl MMG (SLI), joined up with the Bn at this point.

The Bn moved off for a new assembly area at \$93885 that night and on the 16th Sep crossed the R. Marano to X-rds 879906 (codename ORGANDY) on the N bank. Time was given here for the noon meal and the coys were ordered forward to take up tactical posns to the SE of codename FOXBOROUGH (862924).

The R22R were in possession of FOXBOROUGH (862924), at that time. Fire plan and other sp plans had previously been laid on at an O Gp held at ORGANDY by Maj R.P. Clark who had been called forward from Main Bn HQ. after/Lt Col D.H. Rosser way had been wounded when Tac Bn HQ received a direct hit by a shell. The Bn was coming under severe arty fire which was later found to be the main part of the enemy defence. Orders for the attack were received at 1500 hrs from Ede HQ. PPCLI were to take over WHIPCORD 856928 from the R22R and exploit to the line of railway (ANKER) where we were to conc by 0700 hrs of the 17th and patrol river crossing (JiG) to the Arthur at 849939. An order from Bde at 2000 hrs cancelled the attacks \* to allow further air force attacks on MAKER The Bnicarried out the remainder of the plan C coy reaching WHIPCORD at 0230 hrs of the 17th. The patrol sent out to recce the R King was unsuccessful. At 0200 hrs of the 17th all watches were set back one hr to Standard Time. Twice during the morning preparations for a C coy reported enemy movement believed to be counter attacks froming. They were dealt with by our arty and tks. Some enemy armour was known to be in the area.

As B coy had been ordered forward to a posn between FOKBOROUGH AND WHIPCORD the the Bn was now in readiness for the attack which was to come. The intense shellfire inflicted many cas even on our well dug in troops.

H hr which had been 0730 hrs of the 18th was changed to 0700 hrs. The attack was to go in at that time to secure to bine of the railway and the R Xing J.

AT 2315 hrs where an O Gp was held by Lt Col R.P.

Clark to tee up this attack. Major S A Cobbett was brought fwd as

At 0530 hrs 18 Sep, B and D coys moved forward to the attack. Heavy cas were suffered and Maj P.D. Crofton, OC D coy, was wounded. Maj C.M. McDougall OC B coy, took over comd of the remainder of the coys and continued the advance. When finally consolidated 200 yds S of TARA on the railway line B And D coys numbered approx 60. No the remainder of the to the right of B Sqn 145 RTR and Maj Ingraam had been killed.

Capt R.W. Potts had been sent for to take over D coy. On his arrival at Foxborough he was given orders to take forward to Maj C.M. McDougall B and D coys were to move across ANKER and consolidate there which was accomplished by 1245 hrs. A and C coys were in reserve at WHIPCORD in readiness. An order from Bde HQ cancelled further attacks on the Fortunato feature until further notice. Our A Tk guns had been unable to reach the scene of action due to condition of the rds which were blocked with tks and vehs but by 2230 hrs our A Tk guns and MMGs were established at TARA. All signs pointed to the withdrawal of the enemy to the line of the Fortunato feature.

The only activity on the 19th was the movement of A coy to establish a bridgehead over the R. Ausa at King J and to consolidate at 848940. The X-ing was made passable to vehs by the RCE by 1600 hrs.

There was no further advance but the Bn was to be ready to attack by 0500 hrs of 20 Sep.

moved across the river to fully consolidate the bridgehead held by A and D coys. Tac Bn HQ moved to PIQUE at 2000 hrs. C coy went to 809991 and B coy was given the job of cutting the coast rd at codenames BRUE 835988. B coy after passing through A coy were forced to fight most of the way to BRUE, encountering pockets of enemy on their axis of advance, but reported BRUE snug at 2230 hrs when they contacted 22 NZ Mot Bn who were also moving on BRUE. B came by this formation and moved with them to 845985 returning to BRUE at first light of the 22nd.

The 22nd brought news from Bde that the 2 Cdn Inf Bde would be relieved by the 2 NZ Div who passed through us that morning to continue the advance.

A personal message was received from Brig

T.G. Gibson, "Congratulations to all ranks on a

good job well done under difficult conditions."

We were also notified that the Bde would return to Cattolica for a period of rest and training.

A month of practically continuous action
was over for the Bn and a rest was well earned.
The opposition had been stubborn most of the way,
the enemy's strength lying in his increased arty
fire power. The great majority of our cas had
been caused by Shrapnel. Actual ground contact
with the enemy had been weak on his part, and a
