This battle was part of the Fifth Offentive which started on 22 Apr 51 with the Chinese crossing the river at TEAL bridge and attacking the Glostersin the area of Castle Hill 1703. The fact that the attack jumped off from the very area we were setting in made the discussion very interesting. From official accounts, regt histories, and from personal accounts the CO had pleced together the story of the defence by 29 Inf Bde of the ground in front of KAMAK SAN. The discusion in the Mess was meatly by way of introdution. At 1000 hrs we embussed in many many jeeps and proceeded to the small village of NULMONG\*NI 2301. There we devested ourselves of parkas, ett. and fallowed the CO up the moutain. KAMAK SAN is a high rugged hill ever 2000 ft high and is the most dominant feature in this part of Western KOREA. It's steep slopes are heavily wooded - heavily for this part of the world that is, actually the largest trees are only 6" in diameter - and long rocky fingers run out from the main hill mass. To the Koreans it has some sort of sacred attachment. KAMAK SAN is the key feature in our line KANSAS defences and the seizure of it by the chinese enabled the encirclement of the Glesters and almost of the Ulsters. The CO brought us to this hill to illustrate the vital importance of defending the heights and showing the felly of having ground in your rearx which provides observation of your position.
