LT COL WILSON-SMITH then broke the parade off, and personally went around to all the troops and shook hands with them all, wishing them good luck in the future. There was no contact with the enemy during this day. The MMGs lost a man tonight, Pte Canning, he became 2 May 52 seriously ill at the stomach, and died enroute to the Regimental Aid Post.

A Company reported enemy flares on a bearing of 305 degrees 2358 from MR 159139. D Company reported a Korean Service Corp killed in one of May 52 our own mine fields at MR 14951645. Captain Dudley took quick action, ordered all personnel away from the mine field. The Pioneers went in and brought the body out. He died before first aid treatment could be completed. One of the Fioneers was slightly wounded during the proceedure when another mine exploded nearby. The cause of the second explosion is obscure. Towards evening the sky was alive with planes of all types. There were Heliocopters, Harvards, AOPs and · Corsairs all circling around hill 156. There was nothing else to report in the alearly part of the evening and our defences carried out normal routine watchfulness.

While the petrol point was afire and shelling going on Pte Brunner managed to drive his gas truck loaded with ten barrels of gas out of the danger area.
